

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

Aquamarine is derived from the Latin word for seawater. Through history varieties of the stone of a sea green coloration were more popular but now, the bluer, the better. Madagascar yields a partcularly dark blue variety.

20TH EMERALD

Emerald is formed from beryl like the gemstone Aquamarine. Revered by Cleopatra, the first known Emeralds were mined in Egypt around 1500 BC. It looks stunning when set in both white and yellow Gold, we have a sensational collection of Emerald jewellery to mark your special anniversary.

21ST IOLITE

Iolite is a magnesium iron aluminium cyclosilicate, the stones vary in clarity and colour ranging from grey through purple to blue. We suggest an alternative of Kyanite from our contemporary Gemrocks Collection.

22ND SPINE

The deep-red colour form of Spinel, also called Ruby Spinel, is the most sought after form of this stone, there are also pink and black forms.

23RD IMPERIAL TOPAZ

First discovered in Brazil and the Ural mountains, this is the rarest form of Topaz. Rare Imperial and Diamond jewellery can really add a touch of glamour with its warm honey hue and champagne hues.

24TH TANZANITE

A rare Royal blue, indigo, violet/purple gemstone found in only one place in the world, from a small mining site in Tanzania. We have an equisite collection of Tanzanite jewellery for you to view.

25TH SILVER

Silver artefacts have been crafted since as far back as 3000 BC but sterling Silver is used in high-quality Silver jewellery today. It is made up of 92.5% pure Silver, mixed with alloys to add strength and durability.

OCEAN JASPER is a multi-coloured translucent stone found only in Madagascar, it usually exhibits spherical or orb like patterns and is used with great effect in jewellery.



TOURMALINE is available in a wide variety of colours: blue, green, red, yellow, pink, etc. Bi-coloured and multi-coloured crystals are common, which may be green at one end and pink at the other. Watermelon tourmaline is usually green on the outside and pink on the inside.



MOSS AGATE
has sets of mineral inclusions which
resemble trees, plants, and landscapes.

Agates available.



NATURAL TURQUOISE
Turquoise is found in only a few places
on earth where the environment is
dry and usually barren. Highly prized



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Being clear on Diamonds

When purchasing Diamond jewellery how can we be sure of the quality of the Diamonds which are used?

There are also a few attributes to consider when purchasing Diamond jewellery, especially if in the long term you hope that the jewellery will retain its value, or even appreciate in value.

When considering the value of Diamonds there are four main classification factors often referred to as the four Cs: Cut, Colour, Carat and Clarity, with the finer examples of Diamonds possessing higher grades of each characteristic. Of course when buying Diamond jewellery from a reputable source the quality of the Diamonds will be outlined to you at the point of purchase and will usually be supported with documentation.

A cut above the rest...

The cut of a Diamond can have a vast impact over the value of a stone and is arguably the most important of the 4cs. It does not necessarily have a direct link to the shape of the Diamond, but is more to do with the finish and is as a result of the craftsmanship employed when cutting the stone. This

affects how well the Diamond 'scintillates'. Scintillation is the pattern of bright and dark areas caused by reflections within the Diamond as it or the light source moves. The quality of the cut also determines whether the Diamond emits other colours as the light interacts with it. If the light is scattered into the colours of the rainbow you are seeing the Diamond's 'fire'. The combination of external light reflecting off the Diamond, or 'brightness', the 'fire' and the 'scintillation' is what gives the Diamond its overall 'sparkle' and ultimately its visual

A complex system of grading, arrived at by the GIA (The Gemological Institute of America) over a study which took 15 years, takes these qualities into account when evaluating a Diamond's cut grade. It also considers durability, optimal weight and the quality of craftsmanship that went into aligning and polishing the Diamond's facets. The resulting

GIA Diamond Grading Report is an invaluable tool in helping you pick a dazzling Diamond but ultimately you should also look beyond the measurements and the diagrams and see the jewellery first hand to fall in love with a Diamond that is just right for you.

> **COLOUR** The absence of colour within a white Diamond impacts directly to its value. A white Diamond containing no colour at all will have a higher value than one which has a slight hue. This colour scale is measured and marked with letters from D to Z, with the letter D denoting a Diamond with no colour, while Z indicates the greatest presence of colour in which a stone is still considered to be a white Diamond.

CARAT The weight of a Diamond is referred to in carats. One carat weighs 200 milligrams, or 0.20 grams. Diamonds with a greater carat weight are more valuable than the more common, smaller examples.

CLARITY Visible flaws and even those invisible to the human eve also impact on the value of the stone. Again, a scale ranging from completely flawless specimens though to slightly "included" (flawed) and then the lowest end "included" specimens. Diamonds with a clarity categorised as included will very rarely see any significant appreciation in value.

Other factors to take into account when valuing Diamonds

Blemishes on the surface of a Diamond are also taken into account, whether natural or human caused polish lines, scratches, chips, breaks and other defects. All the decisions on the grade of a Diamond are made when a professional grader views the stone at 10x magnification, or higher. and then checks all of the above criteria and more. A high grade Diamond will rarely depreciate in value and as sources of natural Diamonds (untreated Diamonds) deplete, the demand and value will inevitably rise.

Having a professional grade certificate for a Diamond also increases the chance for the stone to appreciate in value, as a certificate offers physical proof that the Diamond has received an appraisal by an unbiased, qualified expert

Enduring beauty

Diamonds are extremely hardwearing and can withstand enormous temperatures and pressures, although they can still be damaged as they have cleavage points which can be areas of weakness.

Unbelievably, someone I know had a terrible fire where the whole house was burned down. The lady of the house had some fine Diamond jewellery which she had inherited from her mother. When the ashes had cooled down a couple of her great friends sifted through the debris, and remarkably they found the Diamonds which were completely unscathed, although the ring mounts had melted away. I remade the ring with a design which was similar to the original.

A MIRACLE OF GEOLOGY

Diamonds are formed up to 118 miles below the surface of the earth. Under the searing temperatures of between 900 and 1300 degrees C and unimaginable pressure, carbon was crystallised into Diamond billions of years ago. These natural Diamonds then made their way to the surface of the earth. Forced upwards

Until 1866 India was the home of Diamonds. They were first mined there 4,000 years ago and were revered associated with the gods often adorning statues and representing the eyes.

The huge Eureka Diamond found on a bank of South Africa's Orange River signalled a new era in Diamonds and the subsequent Diamond Rush in Africa uncovered a wealth of hidden Diamonds that made Africa the world leader in Diamond mining and production.





Your Jewellery What do you value?

We all know, deep down, that we should see valuations and insurance as a positive thing, but merely uttering the words after the purchase of a piece of fine jewellery can detract from the emotions associated with your experience.

The thought that we may ever need to replace our jewellery is furthest from our minds at that point, but too often I have seen the sadness that comes when a piece has been lost or damaged and the replacement value has been incorrect.

There is often confusion associated with jewellery valuations if carried out for the wrong purpose or not done accurately.

An Insurance Valuation should detail the full retail replacement value "as new" of your jewellery, VAT inclusive, and will take into account the components, quality and design of the pieces. It is, therefore, a statement of the highest value of your assets.

An antique dealer might alternatively provide you with an appraisal which indicates a much lower value, the indemnity value "like for like", and if this basis is used to insure your jewellery you may simply not be covered to the desired extent, should you wish to replace it. This value would be more appropriate to determine the piece's value for sale at auction or via a second hand jewellery dealer.

In any instance it is astute to have your fine jewellery valued by an experienced and fully qualified NAJ (National Association of Jewellers) jewellery professional, as recognised by the Institute of Registered Valuers. These skilled gemmologists will thoroughly examine each component part and supply the detail required in a comprehensive report with an accurate replacement value, so that you are properly covered by your insurers.

At Heidi Kjeldsen your jewellery pieces will also be cleaned and inspected, and included within the valuation will be a condition statement which may also advise of any repair work required, such as for loose stones or damaged claws.

Jewellery should ideally be valued every 2-5 years, as raw material prices do fluctuate over time.

Sometimes it may be tempting to go with a 'FREE' or low cost alternative to a proper NAJ Valuation, but

SOME USEFUL POINTS

- 1. Do not keep your jewellery, proof of purchase and valuation documents together. This will simply aid thieves.
- 2. A safe for your jewellery will increase your own peace of mind, and in some cases reduce your premiums.
- 3. Try not to put it off! Potentially failing to satisfactorily negotiate a compensation amount to replace your jewellery will be an added emotional strain on you in the event of a claim.
- 4. Do not have you jewellery valued abroad. You will be insured for a replacement based on prices and rates which will not take into consideration the expense of getting to that destination and furthermore may have no real guarantee as to their quality or provenance.
- 5. In many cases your purchase may be covered by your household insurance policy but we recommend you always inform your insurers of a new purchase so that they can advise accordingly.
- 6. It is important to check the small print in your insurance policy document and negotiate the cover required. If necessary do shop around to acquire quotations to cover your jewellery on its own; you may find it more cost effective to insure it in this way.

more often than not this can lead to inaccurate valuation statements.

All of this is so important for you to consider, and will ensure that you acquire the correct value of insurance cover for your jewellery. If the worst were to happen then you will have peace of mind, and your "investment" will be protected.
